In order to help the computer find locations on your drive, you need to format it with a *file system*



The file system determines the exact way data is organized on the drive

To the operating system, files are stored in *clusters*

Each cluster points to the next cluster's number, or indicates that it's the last cluster (OxFFFF)

Since 1998, Apple has used the HFS+ (Hierarchical File

Since 1993, Windows has used the *NTFS* file system Out of the box, Macs can read but not write to NTFS drives

Dual Booting

Install 2 (or more) operating systems on a computer

- » Windows 7 & Ubuntu Linux
- » macOS & Windows 10
- » Windows 7 & Windows 10
- » Mac OS X Yosemite & El Capitan
- » & more...

When you turn on your Mac, you choose which OS

macOS includes Boot Camp, which makes it easy to set up dual-booting



Boot Camp Assistant

Each operating system requires its own partition on the disk. Drag the divider to set the size of the partitions, or click the Divide Equally button.

However, every time you want to use software on the other OS, you have to reboot

This quickly grows tedious, although it makes sense for games & other apps

Dual booting is great if you need Windows to have full

Virtualization

Allows users to run multiple operating systems on one machine *at the same time*

macOS—the OS installed directly on the computer—is the *host*

Windows—& other virtualized operating systems—are *guests*

Each guest thinks it's the only OS running on the computer









Why virtualize?

- » Security
- » Easy backup
- » Run that one Windows app you have to use
- » Maximize the software you can run
- » Ease of migration
- » Testing
- » Crutch

app you *have* to use you can run

How to virtualize

- environment
- 3. Repeat step 2 as necessary
- 4. Open & run guest OS's on your Mac

You need lots of RAM & a fast CPU!

1. Install virtualization software on your Mac (the host) 2. Install Windows (or Linux, or...) inside virtualization

3 choices for virtualization software on Macs

- » Parallels
- » VMware Fusion
 » VirtualBox











VMWare Fusion is good too, but recently there has some upheaval at the company
